**B1 Rich Fruit Cake – Recipe supplied sponsored by the ASC.**

The winner will be required to bake a second "Rich Fruit Cake" in order to compete in a Group Final to be conducted by each of the fourteen Groups of the Agricultural Societies Council of NSW.

The fourteen winners at Group level will each receive a cash prize of \$30 and are required to bake a third "Rich Fruit Cake" for the final judging at the Royal Easter Show where the winner will receive a cash prize of \$100.00.

**Note:** In any year an individual competitor may participate in only one Group Final representing a Show Society and, consequently, may represent only one Group in the subsequent State Final.

**Ingredients:**

250g (8 oz.) sultanas

250 g (8 oz.) chopped raisins

250 g (8 oz.) currants

125 g (4 oz.) chopped mixed peel

90 g (3oz.) chopped red glace cherries

90 g (3 oz.) chopped blanched almonds

1/3 cup sherry or brandy

250 g (8 oz.) plain flour

60 g (2 oz.) self-raising flour

1/4 teaspoon grated nutmeg

1/2 teaspoon ground ginger

1/2 teaspoon ground cloves

250g (8 oz.) butter

250g (8 oz.) soft brown sugar

½ teaspoon lemon essence OR finely grated lemon rind

½ teaspoon almond essence

½ teaspoon vanilla essence

4 large eggs

**Method:**

Mix together all the fruits and nuts and sprinkle with the sherry or brandy. Cover and leave for at least 1 hour, but preferably overnight.

Sift together the flours and spices.

Cream together the butter and sugar with the essences.

Add the eggs one at a time, beating well after each addition, then alternately add the fruit and flour mixtures.

Mix thoroughly. The mixture should be stiff enough to support a wooden spoon.

Place the mixture into a prepared tin no larger than 20cm (8") and bake in a slow oven for approximately 3 ½ - 4 hours.

Allow the cake to cool in the tin.

Note: To ensure uniformity and depending upon the size it is suggested the raisins be snipped into 2 or 3 pieces, cherries into 4 – 6 pieces and almonds crosswise into 3 – 4 pieces.

**Attention Judges** - All Fruit cakes are to be cut in half when being judged.

**CWA Recipes 2020** (Recipes listed must be used)

**JA14 Lemon Slice (unbaked)**

Grease slice tin and line tin with baking paper – this will make it easier to remove slice.

**Ingredients**

1 packet Marie biscuits

1 cup coconut

rind of 1 lemon – grated (save the juice for icing)

125 grams butter- melted

½ tin condensed milk

**Icing**

Extra coconut for icing

2 cups icing sugar

3 tblsp. lemon juice (saved)

40g soft butter

**Method**

Crush biscuits- (no large pieces). Add coconut. Add melted butter, lemon rind and condensed milk and mix well.

Press into slice tin and place in fridge to set.

Ice with lemon icing, and sprinkle with coconut.

**Lemon Icing**

Mix icing sugar with butter and lemon juice until smooth (if too dry add tiny amount of water).

Spread over slice and allow to set. Cut into slices.

## **JB14 CWA Chocolate Butter Cake**

### **Ingredients**

125g butter  
1 3/4 cups self-raising flour  
1 1/4 cups caster sugar  
1/2 teaspoon bicarbonate soda  
2 eggs  
1 cup milk  
2 tablespoons cocoa  
Chocolate Icing

### **Method**

Preheat oven to 180 degrees or 160 degrees fan forced.  
Place all ingredients into a bowl & beat well until the chocolate mixture changes colour & all the ingredients are combined. A processor can be used if desired.  
Grease & line a 20cm tin (round or square).  
Pour the mixture into the tin. Bang the tin slightly to even out the mixture.  
Cook in a moderate oven for about 1 hour (this will depend on your oven) until cake is cooked.  
TIP: If when touched in the centre, the cake comes away from the sides of the tin it is ready.  
When cool, ice on top with chocolate icing.

## **JC13 and Senior Section Peach Blossom Cake**

### **Ingredients**

190g butter at room temperature, chopped  
1 1/4 cups white sugar  
3/4 cup milk  
1 teaspoon vanilla essence  
1 1/2 cups plain flour  
3/4 cup corn flour  
1 1/2 level teaspoon baking powder  
pinch of salt  
6 egg whites—at room temperature  
1–2 drops rose-pink food coloring

### **Icing**

1 1/2 cups icing sugar  
10g butter  
2 tablespoons boiling water  
few drops of rose-pink food coloring

## **Method**

Pre-heat the oven to slow (150°C). Grease a 20cm round, deep cake tin. Line the base of the tin with baking paper.

Cream the butter and sugar in the small bowl of an electric mixer until white and fluffy. Gradually add half the milk to help dissolve the sugar and beat well. Beat in the vanilla. Transfer to a larger bowl.

Sift the flour, corn flour, baking powder and salt together three times. Fold into the butter mixture, then add the remaining milk. In another bowl, use clean beaters to beat the egg whites to stiff peaks. Fold half the egg whites into the cake batter, then fold in the remaining egg whites.

Transfer 1 cup of the mixture to a smaller bowl and stir in the drops of food coloring. Take about  $\frac{3}{4}$  cup of the white mixture and spread over the base of the tin. Take half the pink batter and spoon it in a ring about 1 cm in from the edge of the tin—it should be about 1–1.5cm wide.

Very carefully spread half the remaining white batter over, taking care not to disturb the pink ring. Spoon the remaining pink batter into the center of the tin, making a round of about 8 cm. Spoon the rest of the white batter over the whole top, again taking care not to disturb the pink round.

Bake for about 70 minutes, until the cake is springy to a gentle touch in the center and comes away from the sides of the tin. It may appear slightly cracked in the center but should settle flat on cooling. Turn out onto a clean tea towel lined with a sheet of baking paper. Leave to cool.

To make the icing, combine the ingredients until smooth. Spread over the top of the cooled cake and leave to set.

**Carrot & Lemon Jam** (CWA Land Cookery Recipe)

### **Ingredients**

3 ½ cups hot water

2 lemons cut very fine

2 medium size carrots grated

4 cups sugar warmed (almost 1 kilo)

### **Method**

Cut lemons finely and combine with grated carrots

Add hot water and stand overnight.

Next day cook in heavy based pan until tender, then add warmed sugar.

Stir until all sugar is dissolved.

Continue cooking until jam is set.

Fill sterilized jars with jam while hot, and seal.
