- All exhibits to be made within the last 18 months and not to have been exhibited at a previous Maitland Show.
- All entries must be exhibitor's own work
- All work to be handmade, unwashed, clean, not worn and complete.
- Painted/glued items must be completely dry.
- Paintings and drawings must be mounted on cardboard
- No names are to be on articles.
- The judge reserves the right to reject any entry which is not considered to be satisfactory. Where there are only 1 or 2 entrants in a class, First and Second place will only be awarded if the entries are of First and Second place quality.
- In event of limited space, all entries may not be displayed.
- Exhibits intended for display only will not be accepted.

1760 S1 Skein of hand spun plied yarn from animal fibre

e.g.: wool, mohair, alpaca, silk etc. No blends. Washed. Include sample of fibre.

1761 S2 Skein of hand spun plied yarn from any other fibre including blends.

e.g.: cotton, linen, hemp, synthetic. Include sample of fibre.

1762 S3 Any scarf made from hand spun. Any technique. eg. knitted, crochet, woven

1763 S4 Article made entirely from hand spun, any technique.

e.g.: beanies, socks, mittens, jumpers, toys. State fibre used and include sample of fibre.

1764 W1 Any handwoven accessory e.g. Scarf, stole or shawl. Any fibre, any technique.

1765 W2 Any other handwoven article

e.g.: cushion cover, table mats, towels etc. State fibre/yarn used. Include sample of yarn.

1766 W3 Any hand-woven item from pure wool. Can be commercial. Must include sample.

1767 W4 Any band weaving, warp faced, braid, inkle or backstrap weaving.

1768 W5 Any hand crafted felt article. e.g. garment, scarf, wrap, toy

1769 W6 NOVICE: Any article, hand spun, handwoven or felted. Includes skeins.

Entrant must have commenced the craft in the last two years.

### 1855 THREE DIFFERENT TYPES OF WOOL ARTICLES AND/OR GARMENTS

#### CONDITIONS:

1. For the purpose of this competition the following definitions apply:
  - a) Garment: an item that can be worn e.g. dress, jacket, scarf, hat
  - b) Article: a utility item that is not worn but can be used in the home e.g. blanket; with an outfit e.g. bag; for amusement e.g. toy; as a decoration e.g. picture etc.
  - c) Three Different Types: the 3 items in an entry must differ from each other in terms of their construction technique and/or their purpose eg. 1 a knitted jumper, blanket and tea cosy OR eg. 2 a knitted tea cosy, a crocheted tea cosy or a felted tea cosy OR eg. 3 a knitted jumper, a knitted blanket and a crocheted blanket.
2. All articles/garments must contain a minimum of 80% sheep wool, excluding lining, to qualify for competition.
3. Exhibits (articles/garments) may be knitted, crocheted, sewn, felted etc and must be hand crafted (use of machine is permitted).
4. **A sample of the yarn, fabric or fibre with label must be attached** to each item making up the exhibit. If a label is not available such as in the case of a hand spun or felted item, a handwritten label with relevant details and sample will suffice.”
5. An exhibit in this competition may consist of the work of one individual or a group of individuals, or an organization.
6. All three article/garments must have been completed within the 12 months prior to the local show and made by the exhibitor/s.
7. An exhibit having won at a local show may be exhibited (the same three article/garments) at the Group Final. The winning exhibit at the Group Final is then eligible to compete in the State Final.
8. An exhibit is only eligible to represent one Society at Group level and one Group at State level.
9. An exhibit (article/garment) that has previously competed at Group level is not eligible to compete again.
10. If this class is not scheduled or attracts no entries at a local show, the Chief Pavilion Steward in consultation with the appropriate Pavilion Section Judges, may select three suitable individual exhibits and, with the exhibitor's permission, enter them in the Group judging as an exhibit representing the particular Society concerned.
11. It is the responsibility of the Group Secretary and winner to co-ordinate the transfer of the winning entry to the ASC Office in Sydney for the State judging.
12. *Recommendation:* State Final garments are to include a photo of the garment being worn (where possible and applicable).

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
